You have 65 minutes to complete the section. Passages are presented either individually or paired with another passage. Some passages may contain tables, charts, or charts , but they do not require any mathematical or thematic knowledge. Passages will always include: One passage from classical or contemporary literature (from the US or around the world) One passage on the subject of social sciences (e.g. sociology, psychology or economics) One passage (or a few passages) from (or inspired by) a US founding document (e.g. the US Constitution or a speech by the President) Two passages (or a passage and which are focused on science, including Earth science, chemistry, physics or biology. Sat Reading section tries to measure the following: Command evidence - find the evidence that best supports the answer; determine how the authors support their claims with evidence; identify the relationships between information graphics and reading passages. Words in context - determine how meaning, tone and style are shaped by the author's word choices; identify the meaning of the word based on the contextual clues in the passage. Analysis in history / social studies and science - examine hypotheses; interpret the data; draw conclusions; consider the consequences. The SAT writing and SAT language writing and language folder consists of 44 questions with a choice of multiple options. You have 35 minutes to complete this section. This section represents reading passages that contain intentional errors. You will be prompted to correct errors by selecting the best possible replacement. All questions in this section will test your ability to improve your arcade writing style. This section still requires a firm understanding of grammar rules, including punctuation and the normal use of English. The sat writing and language component evaluates the following skills: Standard English Conventions – you will revise punctuation, words, clauses, and sentences. You will be tested on: comma use, parallel construction, verb time, and submission agreement. Expression of ideas - you will have questions about the organization of the passage and the impact. You will be prompted to select words or structural changes that will improve the passage. Words in context - you will be prompted to select the best choice of words based on the context of the sentence. You are expected to select words that improve the tone, style, or syntax of the selection. Command of Evidence – You will have questions that require you to improve the way reading a passage develops ideas and information. Analysis in history / social studies and in science - you will have passages on history, social studies and science. You are expected to select changes to passages that improve them. The SAT Math Sat Math section is divided into two parts. The No Calculator section has 20 questions with a time limit of 25 minutes. The permitted part of the calculator has 38 questions with a time limit of 55 minutes. There are two types of questions in the math section – the traditional selection of multiple options and the grid in the questions that require you to determine the answer with the selection of the options. The SAT Math section focuses on the following mathematical topics: The heart of algebra - to create, solve and interpret linear expressions in one or two variables; interpret variables and constants in linear functions in context; understanding the connection between graphical and algebraic representations. Problem solving and data analysis - solving one-step and multi-step problems involving: measurement, units, unit conversions, percentages, ratios, ratios, proportional relationships and scale drawings; evaluate charts dispersion of fences; compare and contrast linear and exponential growth; summarize categorical data, retrieve frequencies, and calculate the conditional probability of bidirectional tables; use statistics to analyze shape, spread, and center. You are expected to support your explanation of the evidence from the passage. You have 50 minutes to finish your essay. Each SAT essay challenge is almost identical to this example: As you read the passage below, consider how [the author] uses evidence, such as facts or examples, to support the claim. evidence, such as facts or examples, to support the claim. develop ideas and link claims and evidence. stylistic or compelling elements, such as the choice of word or appeals to emotions, add strength to the expressed thoughts. Write an essay in which you explain how [the author] puts the argument to convince [his/her] audience that [the author's claim]. In your essay, analyze how [the author] uses one or more of the above functions (or properties of your choice) to reinforce the logic and persuasiveness of [his] argument. Make sure your analysis focuses on the most important features of the passage. Your essay should not explain whether you agree with [the author's] claims, but rather explain how the author builds an argument to convince [his/her] audience.
